2008 Naomi L. Satterfield Memorial Scholarship



Receiving the Naomi L. Satterfield Memorial Scholarship was a really big honor. The money, of course, was nice, but what made it truly special was the recognition for all of my hard work. I think a lot of times leaders put in a lot of effort to make their organization better, but so much of it is behind the

scenes and goes unnoticed. The scholarship provided me with an avenue to demonstrate to my local chapter all the hard work that it takes to turn a good organization into a great one. Furthermore, it was a great way to show them that achievements do get recognized. I hope that I inspired the Zeta Gamma Chapter of Phi Chi Theta to follow in my footsteps and work towards constantly growing and improving, as opposed to being complacent with the current ways.

I would encourage everyone who made a difference in Phi Chi Theta to apply for the scholarship. The process is quick and simple compared to the long hours spent improving your chapter. One piece of advice that I would give to those applying would be to start early. Beginning the process early on signals that you are committed and you are more likely to find time to complete it if you have already put a lot of effort in it. Plus, it is important to give your school time to gather your transcript and past employers, teachers and an office of your fraternity to write recommendation letters.

It was wonderful receiving it from Danity Little since the scholarship I received was a donation from her, in her father's name. I am very thankful to have been awarded this scholarship. I am paying for college by myself, (through loans as of right now) so scholarships really mean a lot to me. I am going on a study-abroad trip this winter to Australia and New Zealand and I plan on using the scholarship money for tuition through the University of Maryland.

To those who are filling out the scholarship application in the spring, I have some helpful hints. First of all, plan ahead. Make sure you read the scholarship application thoroughly. Also, be aware that you need to have two letters of recommendation, so doing the scholarship application at the last minute is a bad idea. Ask a member of Phi Chi Theta (usually the President) and a professor at least a month before the deadline.

I have put a lot of time and energy into Phi Chi Theta because it is an organization that means a lot to me. Phi Chi Theta has given me so many great opportunities. I am very fortunate to have been awarded the scholarship this year.

For me, the challenge of the essay was to condense my love for PCT into an essay on how PCT has influenced and will continue to influence my professional and scholastic achievements.

I am currently in the second phase of my career as I focus on completion of a Master's Degree. I am passionate about our community and I am dedicating my career to serving the citizens through government service. Phi Chi Theta has taught me to be flexible in my ideas and to always strive to be the best that I can be.

6 Interview with a Board Member – Dr. Danity Little



In our continuing “Interview with a Board Member” series, Fran Spencer sat down with Dr. Danity Little at the National Chapter Meeting in Memphis, TN to ask her some questions about her Phi Chi Theta, work-life experiences, and advice to share with the next generation of business leaders and professionals.

Fran: You have funded a [Phi Chi Theta Educational Foundation scholarship](#) in your father's name (Lester F. Richardson). What is the best advice he ever gave you?

Dani: *The best advice he gave me was to know yourself well enough to know what you want out of life; then ask for it and you will get it through hard work and a positive attitude.*

Fran: Many years of your career were spent in government service with the Customs Dept. Today, young people are reluctant to enter a government career. What would you say was the greatest benefit you experienced as a result of your government service?

Dani: *As a government employee, it is hard to single out just one benefit. At least three stands out--1. The people I came in contact were at high levels for the most part and I learned so much from them. 2. The work was very varied and I never had a job I didn't like. 3. The benefits now that I am retired are also great.*

Fran: You were National President of Phi Chi Theta during its transition to a coed fraternity. Tell us what stands out in your mind as a memory of those times.

Dani: *This was a very difficult time for us as a Fraternity. I remember many hours making strategic plans on how could we survive and still be a viable Fraternity that would meet the needs of our members. I always felt if we could have gone back in time to 1978 and bit the bullet and allowed men to join us and jumped the gun with*

the other men's fraternities that Phi Chi Theta would have surpassed them. Phi Chi Theta has always been highly regarded on college campuses and we would have run off with the prize--more members and a strong Fraternity. As it happened, we were slow to give up our status as an all women Fraternity and by the time it sunk in, we could not win the battle, the other fraternities were well ahead of us. During this timeframe, the collegiate members were strong and during elections at the National level they kept wanting us to remain as we were a family--we still believed "Once a Phi Chi Theta always a lifetime Phi Chi Theta." Let's just say this was a very painful time for the Fraternity.

Fran: If you could spend a year of your life as someone else (someone who is either dead or alive) who would it be?

Dani: *This is a tough question. I admire a lot of people for different talents they have or had. I don't know if I would like to spend a year as someone else but I would like to experience being someone so opposite of me-- like Madonna or Britney Spears. I know that answer will probably surprise many people who know me because I am usually so analytical and serious. I would probably have to analyze this question more before I could come up with someone for a whole year.*

Fran: You've designed and supervised the building of two awesomely large homes for your own use. Tell us about that experience.

Dani: *Wow, that would consume pages in fact probably a book on the experiences derived from designing and building your own home. I guess the one memory that stands out is the obtaining of the building permit. I spent many hours at the library researching the law and came to the realization I needed to hire a zoning lawyer. He was able to find a 1920 loophole that all trailer parks had to have a caretaker home. So that is how I got to build the 6,000+ sq ft house in Florida--29 feet from the intracoastal. You got to have patience one ingredient necessary to survive building a house.*

Fran: You have, literally, hundreds of books in your home. Please list 5 of your favorite books.

Dani: *My favorite author is Irving Wallace--I enjoy his historical fiction novels. Other books enjoy reading--All herbal books and cookbooks especially the early folk-type cooking and gardening. I just discovered an author, Janet Evanovich, for out loud, crying laughter; she is a bounty hunter and she makes me laugh. I enjoy going to the library and just checking out books and reading them; it really doesn't matter what it is. I read at least two books a week; on average probably closer to three a week.*

Fran: Family, we know, is very important to you. What is your fondest memory of time with your family?

Dani: *One of my fondest memories is when my dad and I worked on getting his book published. After it was published, I was asked to be part of a Table of Contents circuit for state of Georgia and I requested my Dad's book to be featured and take my place. They accepted the proposal--seeing my Dad*

and Mother at this event was one of the most exciting times with my family.

Fran: What would you say to encourage collegiates and alums to get involved with the Foundation?

Dani: *I believe if the collegiates and alums were to get involved either financially or by becoming a trustee they would realize several benefits that would serve them well. Such as a collegiate, they would experience many business talents that they could transfer to their first job--writing, listening, observing, and being responsible for a task or a committee; for an alum, they would be benefiting by continuing their relationship with other alums and continuing our tradition of once a Phi Chi Theta always a Phi Chi Theta. Yes, for both, the collegiates and alums, the friendships*

and networking they will derive is the major benefit of all.

Fran: What is your strongest memory of your PCT collegiate days?

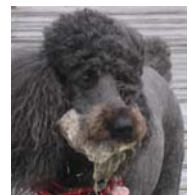


Dani: *The strongest memory of my collegiate days is the reactivation team for the Alpha Mu chapter at the University of Maryland. We not only reactivated the Chapter but the advisor for the Delta Sigma Pi chapter was our biggest supporter and this caused a great rivalry between the two fraternities. When Phi Chi Theta was chosen to sit on the Dean's Council, we all felt so proud and enjoyed the limelight. I have great memories with Phi Chi Theta and most of them are due to the friendships that have continued through the years after graduation.*

Fran: What would your advice be to collegiate members as they prepare for our rapidly changing business world?

Dani: *If they are not computer literate--get there. If you are computer literate--get out of your isolation booth (computer) and meet as many people as you can and interact with them in a professional manner.*

Fran: In your personal life, we know about Charly, your 4-legged furperson (a black standard poodle); what other hobbies/interests do you enjoy?



Dani: *Needless to say, reading is my favorite hobby. I am involved in an herbal society and I enjoy making "stuff" and cooking with the herbs. I also enjoy giving workshops and teaching a class in natural cosmetics--mayonnaise for your hair conditioner, tomatoes for your hands, yogurt for a cleanser, strawberry jam for a scrub, fun things. I also enjoy making my own herbal medicines and teas. I also play tennis and do all my yard work. I love too travel.*

Business Etiquette Tip of the Month

Ann Marie Sabath, Founder of At Ease Inc. and National Honorary Member



Isn't it funny how we all have the same amount of time each day and yet we all use it so differently? Some people are so productive while others piddle away their time wondering where it went at the end

of each day, week.....and year. This month's tip is dedicated to assisting you in getting more time out of each day.

Do you plan your work and then work your plan? Do you act rather than react? Do you manage interruptions rather than letting them control you?

Good time managers create a daily list of what they want to accomplish. When they have a block of 10 minutes or an hour, they go directly to that list to see what they can get done. They

also plan a time of the day when they can act rather than react. For some, it is the beginning of the day before phones start ringing, people dropping by and e-mail messages start coming in. For others, it is the end of the day when most people are long gone.

Finally, good time managers see interruptions as opportunities. They answer questions in a succinct manner and encourage others to do the same. They stand up when someone unexpectedly enters their work area rather than inviting the person to take a seat.
